"Out of the paper bag fell a peanut butter sandwich, an apple and a cookie. Crayoned in large letters was a little girl's name, *Christy – Room 104*. She had given up her lunch for some hungry person."

That child's parents – if they knew it – could be very proud of their daughter. She understands the joy in life that comes from helping others.

Whenever we give out of a heart of concern for people in need, we are making a sacrifice that pleases the Lord. "But do not forget to do good and to share, for with such sacrifices is God well pleased" (Hebrews 13:16).
