I put her in bed, and there was such a beautiful smile on her face. She took hold of my hand as she said two words only: "Thank you." Then she died.

I could not help but examine my conscience before her. What would I say if I were in her place? My answer was very simple. I would have tried to draw a little attention to myself. I would have said, "I am hungry. I am dying. I am in pain," or something. But she gave me much more; she gave me her grateful love. And she died with a smile on her face."

Pain, suffering and death are part of the experience of our associates as they respond to God's call to care for His children. It's an awesome responsibility they assume.

The reward: Gratitude brings a smile and becomes a precious gift.
