Jazz great Benny Goodman – known as the King of Swing – was a musician, clarinetist and bandleader, born in 1909 and died in 1986.

He once recalled practicing his clarinet for a long time by an open window and occasionally looking out at his wife as she worked in her beloved garden.



When she came in, she asked him how he could stand to repeat the same task over and over. He smiled and replied that as he had been watching her laboring in the sun, he had been thinking the same about her.

He went on to say that "good results depend inevitably on the work one is willing to put into it," because "in the work itself – whether planting or practicing – you find your true enjoyment."

Often you can see this – not in the dramatic or glamorous aspects of their jobs, but in how absorbed with the mundane details they become.
