ALL THE MONEY IN THE WORLD?

A well-dressed European woman was on a safari in Africa. The group stopped briefly at a hospital for lepers.

The heat was intense, and the flies buzzing. She noticed a nurse bending down in the dirt, tending to the pus-filled sores of a leper.

With disdain, the woman remarked, "Why, I wouldn't do that for all the money in the world!"

The nurse quietly replied, "Neither would I."
