An Olympic Champion

Dr. Jennifer "Jenny" Beth Thompson (born Feb. 26, 1973) is a former competitive swimmer and one of the most decorated Olympians in history, winning 12 medals – including eight gold medals (all relay) – while representing the United States in the 1992, 1996, 2000 and 2004 Summer Olympics.



She did not win any of the golds in individual events, however; she won them all in team events with three other swimmers.

As a result, some people have questioned whether Thompson's swimming accomplishments ought to rank her with the "great" Olympic champions. She even wonders about that herself: "It's got to be very different to experience an individual gold versus a team gold," she says.

But Thompson's accomplishments in the ego-driven American culture – especially among athletes and other celebrities – are refreshing. With ballplayers moving from team to team, demonstrating little team

loyalty, Thompson is a marvelous example of someone whose genuine success came in the context of team play.
