In 1508, French poet Eloy d'Amerval referred to a *poisson d'avril* (April fool, literally "April fish" – and there is more on that later). In 1539, Flemish poet Eduard de Dene wrote of a nobleman who sent his servants on foolish errands on April 1. In 1686, John Aubrey referred to the holiday as "Fooles holy day," the first British reference. On April 1, 1698, several people were tricked into going to the Tower of London to "see the Lions washed."

Here are a few other practices cited by Wikipedia:

- In Ireland, it was traditional to entrust the victim with an "important letter" to be given to a named person. That person would then ask the victim to take it to someone else, and so on. The letter, when finally opened, contained the words, "send the fool further."
- In Poland, April 1 is a day in which many jokes are told and various hoaxes are prepared by people, the media and even public institutions. Serious activities are avoided. The conviction is so strong that the anti-Turkish alliance with Leopold I, signed on April 1, 1683, was backdated to March 31.
- In the Nordic countries, most news media outlets will publish exactly one false story on April 1; for newspapers, this will typically be a front-page article, but not the top headline.



• In Italy, France, Belgium and French-speaking areas of Switzerland and Canada, April 1 tradition is often known as "April fish." This includes attempting to attach a paper fish to the victim's back without being noticed.
