Finally, the authorities devised a plan. They positioned tractor trailers to block traffic. Then they simultaneously drove three front-end payloaders – the type used for earth moving – into the out-of-control auto. With the car pinned, firefighters broke the driver's side window, reached in, and turned off the ignition.



The car, as you would guess, suffered extensive damage.
