One legend has it that Valentine actually sent the first "valentine" greeting himself. While in prison, it is believed that Valentine fell in love with a young girl, who may have been his jailer's daughter, who visited him during his confinement. Before his death, it is alleged that he wrote her a letter, which he signed, "From your Valentine," an expression that will appear on many cards and notes attached to flowers and candy this weekend.
