
Franklin on the Aid of God


Franklin (1706 – 1790), of course, was one of the Founding Fathers of the United States. And he had a lot of professional pursuits as a printer, author, politician, scientist, postmaster, inventor, newspaper editor, musician, statesman, diplomat and on and on. What a talented individual!

With all of his gifts, he might have easily concluded that men and women could be able to give birth to a nation in and of themselves, without the help of Almighty God. But not Franklin.

Nations rise and fall; leaders come and go. But there is only one King of kings and Lord of lords. It is He who ordains the flow of history and guides the sparrow's flight. God also carefully tends to the needs of His children.

Aiden Wilson Tozer (1897 – 1963), a pastor, preacher and author, offered a similar theme. He wrote: "To the child of God, there is no such thing as an accident. He (the believer) travels an appointed way. Accidents may indeed appear to befall him and misfortune stalks his way; but these evils will be so in appearance only and will seem evil only because we cannot read the secret script of God's hidden providence."
