How We Look at People

In an episode of the old television series *All in the Family,* Edith and Archie are attending Edith's high-school class reunion.



Edith encounters an old classmate named Buck, who has allowed himself to become extremely obese. Edith has a delightful conversation with him about old times and the things they did together, but remarkably, Edith doesn't seem to even notice how extremely heavy her friend has become.

Later, Edith and Archie are talking. She said, "Archie, ain't Buck a beautiful person?"
