William Wolcott, an English artist, decided to go to New York City to record his impressions of the Big Apple. So off he went.

One morning, he was visiting in the office of a former colleague when the urge to sketch suddenly came over him. Seeing some paper on his friend's desk, he asked, "May I have that?"

His friend answered, "That's not sketching paper. That's ordinary wrapping paper."
