## Lesson in Democracy

Election 2004 is over, and Americans can be proud that another demonstration of democracy in action has taken place -- and the world has seen how it should work. President George W. Bush was re-elected to the White House. On Wednesday, he vowed to fulfill the duty Americans have bestowed upon him for another four years.

"America has spoken, and I'm humbled by the trust and confidence of my fellow citizens," he said. "With that trust comes a duty to serve all Americans, and I will do my best to fulfill that duty every day as president." He then appealed to Democratic challenger John Kerry's supporters to help bring the country together.
