Love – in marriage and in other relationships – requires dogged commitment on our part.

Commenting on that subject, Dr. David Jeremiah, senior pastor of Shadow Mountain Community Church in El Cajon, California, wrote in his book, *Turning Points*:

"Contrary to popular opinion, love doesn't come naturally for us humans. Love is others-centered and self-sacrificing. We are self-centered; and, in our own natural selves, we care little about sacrifice unless powerfully motivated.

"In fact, the Bible teaches that only someone who really knows God



through Jesus is capable of the kind of love the Bible describes. John wrote, 'Love comes from God. Everyone who loves has been born of God and knows God. Whoever does not love does not know God, because God is love' (1 John 4:7-8 NIV)."

Jesus said that the world would recognize that we are Christians by our love (John 13:35). "Love grows as we nurture it. It develops as we feed it. It expands as we persist in it. That kind of love has staying power," Dr. Jeremiah said.

And it is that kind of love that motivates the associates of Life Care and Century Park every day in the work they are called to do.
