He built a life-sized Waldo out of plywood and began moving him around the construction site.

He even started a Facebook page for Waldo that offered clues as to where one might spot him and allow visitors to the page the opportunity to tag Waldo in the photos. According to hospital staff, this playful diversion provided a bright spot in the day for many patients and their families.



It was a simple gesture, a wealth of goodwill, a respite.

We may never know the impact of a small act of kindness or a simple gesture, but blessed are those who make the effort, for they truly understand what this life is all about.
