Both freedom and sovereignty are present here, and they do not contradict.

So it is with man's freedom and the sovereignty of God. The mighty liner of God's sovereign design keeps its steady course over the sea of history. Each man and woman has the free will to make choices upon which he or she will be judged – the principal one, which shall determine one's eternal destiny, being the acceptance or rejection of the Christ of Christmas, the cross and resurrection.
