The White Sox were playing the Tigers in Detroit. Lyons bunted and raced down the first-base line. He knew it was going to be tight, so he dove at the bag. Safe! The Tigers' pitcher disagreed. He and the umpire got into a shouting match, and Lyons stepped in to voice his opinion.

Absorbed in the game and the debate, Lyons felt dirt trickling down the inside of his pants. Without missing a beat, he dropped his britches to empty the dirt out and brush off his shirttail and – uh-oh! – 20,000 jaws hit the bleachers' floor.





And, as you can imagine, the jokes began. Women behind the White Sox dugout waved dollar bills when he came onto the field. Within 24 hours of the "exposure," he received more exposure than he'd gotten his entire career: seven live television and about 20 radio interviews.

Fortunately for Lyons, he was wearing sliding pants under his baseball pants, but the incident earned him the nickname, "Moon Man" Lyons.

Now I don't know Steve Lyons, and I am normally not appreciative of men who drop their pants in public. But I think Steve Lyons deserves a salute. Anybody who dives headfirst into first base deserves a salute.
