Prayer in Few Words

"Dad," a little boy once asked, "does the Lord know everything?"

"Yes, son," the father replied. The boy nodded, but didn't look very convinced, prompting the father to ask a question of his own: "Why do you ask?"

"Because," the boy answered, "when the preacher prays, he prays so long telling God everything, that I thought maybe God wasn't clued in on what's happening to folks around here."



"But if He's omniscient, wouldn't praying just annoy Him?"

Spurgeon's prayer needed no elaboration.

And often, ours don't either.

And when you pray, do not use vain repetitions as the heathen do. For they think that they will be heard for their many words. Therefore do not be like them (Matthew 6:7-8).

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
