Along the western coast of Ireland, fishermen use a round-bottomed keel-less craft known as a *currach*. This boat has a tarred canvas over a wooden frame. Because of its unique construction, it is vulnerable to sharp rocks or floating objects, and it requires the oarsmen to cooperate completely, rowing in perfect unison.

Out of this need for unity has come the Irish expression, "You will have to pull with the crew." Or, as another Irish proverb states, "There is not strength without unity."
