Recognizing the restraining hand of God and convicted by the Holy Spirit, Cowper realized that the way out of his troubles was to look to God, not to jump into the river.

With gratitude, he sat down and wrote these reassuring words: "God moves in a mysterious way His wonders to perform; He plants His footsteps in the sea, and rides upon the storm." Those words have brought healing of spirit and comfort to the soul of millions of people down through the years since Cowper penned them.
