Kim Parrish, executive director, and her staff really know how to throw a party – complete with balloons, amazing cakes and a lineup of fruits, cheeses and other assorted goodies that had guests streaming by to satisfy their taste buds. They had Herd Sullivan, White County executive; Wallace Austin, president of the White County Chamber of Commerce; Dr. Abhay Kemkar, the facility's medical director; and Katherine Joy, Life Care's regional vice president; all there for special presentations to the honorees. Don Kelly, pastor of First Community Church of Sparta, and Tim Bumbalough, plant manager, added a spiritual touch with prayers on behalf of the residents.

When the ceremony was over, I told Mrs. Roberts that this was certainly a marvelous milestone. "But next year," I said, "Lola and I will be coming back for your 110th birthday party, and what a special occasion that will be."
