Some of his books included: *If Love Were Oil, I'd* Be About a Quart Low; Elvis Is Dead and I Don't Feel So Good Myself; My Daddy Was a Pistol and I'm a Son of a Gun; and Chili Dogs Always Bark at Night. Well, you get the drift of his humor.



Grizzard had a somewhat troubled life, battling alcoholism, going through three divorces and suffering from a congenital heart defect.
