From early in the morning until late at night, they are exposed to the reality that much of the world endures.

Most of us would benefit from such an experience, but even if we don't sign up for one of these annual trips, we can make a point to take daily reality tours right where we live.

When we struggle with frustrations about mechanical problems in a car, we can embrace the reality that most of the world's citizens don't even own a car.

When we grumble about an office that is too cold or hot, we can remember that the majority of the world doesn't have the luxury of air-conditioning or heat.

When finances seem too cramped, we can think about the billions of people who will never own a home, can't wear more than one set of clothes and seldom eat to their heart's content.

Regular reality tours like this will certainly cause us to be more thankful for the reality that is ours and will inspire compassion that can easily be translated into effective help for those who are less fortunate than ourselves.
