The Rockefeller Vision

The Rockefeller Foundation was chartered on this day in 1913 to "promote the wellbeing of mankind throughout the world." John D. Rockefeller was at one time the world's richest person, having made a fortune in the oil business. He felt a strong sense of stewardship about his financial empire and became famous for his philanthropy.

Rockefeller provided an initial endowment of \$100 million for the foundation, and later increased it to more than \$183 million. By the end of 2001, the endowment was estimated to be \$3.1 billion. Today, the Rockefeller Foundation describes its mission as "a commitment to enrich and sustain the lives and livelihoods of poor and excluded people throughout the world."

Godly people share their resources with those in need. When they do, God promises that He will remember their generosity forever and give them honor (Psalm 112:9). The Apostle Paul urges us to reflect on some of Jesus' words: "It is more blessed to give than to receive" (Acts 20:35). Our natural tendency is to accumulate wealth for our own selfish uses. Receiving is a lot of enjoyment, but generous people discover the greater joy in giving to others.
