Hendrick was initially diagnosed with throat cancer in 2011, Mulligan said. "After treatment, his cancer went into remission, and he was diagnosed as cancer-free in 2012 and had been in remission up until November of 2018, when he was placed on FMLA. At that point, Hendrick was told that the cancer had returned, but this time it was in the lungs and stomach. This month, Hendrick has started his chemotherapy treatments, and he has begun to feel much better."

Listening to Tampubolon speak over the phone, Mulligan said, "I was given a sense of comfort that God isn't finished with him yet. There was a sound of optimism in his voice that I am not sure I would have if I were in his place ... To hear hope in his voice gives me strength and hope where it may not otherwise be found. It is my prayer that God, in His infinite wisdom, grant Hendrick the gift of further life so he can give that strength to others in their time of need."

Hendrick's family includes a 23-year-old son and his sister.

Kailey McNerney, executive director at Hallmark, said she was notified by her admissions director that a Life Care associate and his family were in need. "Our team has a very special place in our hearts for those in need, whether they are employed here in our center or elsewhere," McNerney explained. "In the past year and a half, several of our team members have had personal losses that were unexpected. This allowed our team to bond and to love each other as family. We just wanted to pay it forward, as we feel so lucky to work with the individuals we do daily. We are glad that we could help in this way, and as always, I am very proud of my amazing team."

Familial support for Tampubolon was extended by his own facility, too. His co-workers at Life Care Center of Littleton have also held several fundraisers to help with his medical and personal expenses.
