In considering the noblest professions, people are inclined to think of those who offer a service, such as doctors, teachers or emergency services personnel.

There is no ignoble work except that which is void of ministry. There is no lack of meaning in any job performed with God's love and "as unto the Lord."

Whatever tasks you face today as you go about your responsibilities in Life Care and Century Park, perform them as if you were performing them for Jesus Himself, because ultimately you are.

And never forget: Your job is a real ministry, with everlasting consequences. Rejoice in that knowledge.
